

The last item among this month's concerns was precipitated by the gale warnings we had a few days ago. The Dockmaster and aides checked all lines and retied and adjusted to suit conditions in an effort to avoid damage to the docks and your boats.

I was part of this process, and, I must say, I was alarmed at how many boat owners had inadequately secured their boats. I will also say that the effort to re-secure boats in 30 kts of wind is difficult and dangerous work. The Dockmaster, who is a hard worker and a conscientious guy, has sent out several blasts and other notices to inform members of the Dock Rules and the requirements for adequate securing of boats.

The Dock Rules allow the Dockmaster to make adjustments and modifications and to allow the Club to charge Members for this service.

This is NOT something we should have to do. I suspect that the Board will discuss this at the next meeting and agree that assessments need to be started for those whose boats are inadequately secured in order to protect the Club's property (the docks) and all members' boats.

Please see to it that your boat is secured in compliance with the Club Dock Rules, which are available on the website.

Thanks all. Be careful and be safe. Covid is still around.

Dock Lines (again)... and again!!


YIKES! On February 22 BSC was dealt one helluva blow!

We walked the docks and adjusted lines on a dozen boats. <u>Many</u> were improperly tied. Stating the obvious, here are some tips to keep in mind for the future:

- TWO lines on each of your 4 corners. Several, especially on B dock, are lacking!
- TWO wraps on your pilings, then cleat off. The piling carries the load; the cleat will not!
- DON'T overlap your 2 lines on the pilings. It makes them difficult to adjust.
- SPRINGLINES fore & aft.
- DOCK POWER LINES secured and OUT of the water!
- CROSS YOUR LINES and tie off crossed.
 - Example: starboard bow lines, one to starboard cleat, one to port cleat, and vice versa. If a cleat pulls out, you will remain secure. The same applies to aft lines.
- RINGS: if you have them, one line on each ring. There are 4 rings on each tide-slide piling: 2 for you, 2 for your neighbor.
- WORN/ROTTED/FRAYED LINES: monitor/replace as needed.

Please review these reminders, take a close look at your lines, and adjust as necessary. Remember, we have a ROPE ROOM if you are in need of additional line!

ETYSA Is Now Kicking Off Its Registration For 2021 Camps

We hold week-long summer sailing camps for children between the ages of 8 and 16. The camp is located at Blackbeard Sailing Club, 1215 Barkentine Drive, off Broad Creek Road, in Fairfield Harbour. Camps are scheduled for this summer:

Camp II - July 12-16 Camp II - July 19-23 Camp III - July 26-30 Race Camp - August 2-6



Each camp runs from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday thru Friday.

The cost for each camp is \$175 per week. There is also a once-a-year ETYSA family membership fee of \$50. Blackbeard volunteers who walk the docks securing improperly tied boats in preparation for a forecasted storm do so as a courtesy.


If you can, check your boat yourself.

From the Commodore ...

As a result of numerous boats being damaged during recent storms, the board of directors has taken a serious look at the issues of personal and property safety. The issue of property damage is best summed up by the insurance industry's attitude that any damages incurred by a boat during extreme weather conditions are considered an act of God. As a result of this fact, each individual boat owner is responsible for any and all damage to his own boat. The only exception to this ruling is if a boat owner is negligent in the operation or docking of his boat. Then he is liable for any and all damage caused by his boat. Then he board of directors has recognized that many members may not be aware of proper docking procedures. As a result, all slip renters will be supplied with Chapman's minimum requirements for line size, number and type for different size boats. These requirements have been adopted as minimum specifications for docking at the Blackboard pier. Some of our more experienced sailors have also expressed a willingness to help anyone to determine the best way to tie up his boat.

On the same of personal safety, I would like to thank the small number of club members who consistently show up during a storm to help the down the boats. In particular, we all one a debt of gratitude to Danny Lockero for his vigilance of our property and boats. These individuals have on numerous occasions risked their personal safety to secure boats which were inadequately prepared for heavy winds. I personally do not feel that the club should ask these people to take such a risk.

The responsibility for boating safety rests with the boat owner. I ask your cooperation in meeting these docking guidelines in the hope of preventing future damage of injury. Also, in the near future, we will be sublishing a hurricane contingency plan to educate all club members as to alternative ways of preparing their boats for a hurricane. Let's place a high premium on safety so sailing can remain fun.

As our membership population and participation have grown, so it seems has that of our pets. Due to the large number of people congregating at Blackbeard on weekends, it is recommended that all pets be kept on a leash during times of high activity at the club. Let's all remember our non-pet club members and be sensitive to their rights. Your cooperation as club members will be greatly appreciated.




