

ETYSA Is Now Kicking Off Its Registration For 2021 Camps

We hold week-long summer sailing camps for children between the ages of 8 and 16. The camp is located at Blackbeard Sailing Club, 1215 Barkentine Drive, off Broad Creek Road, in Fairfield Harbour. Camps are scheduled for this summer:

Camp II - July 12-16 Camp II - July 19-23 Camp III - July 26-30 Race Camp - August 2-6

Each camp runs from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The cost for each camp is \$175 per week. There is also a once-a-year ETYSA family membership fee of \$50. This fee entitles children to participate in any ETYSA clinics that will be held during the year. No sailing experience is necessary, but the ability to swim with and without a life jacket is an absolute requirement. Children will be tested on the first morning. They also must have the physical ability to climb into and out of a small boat. Participants will also be required to follow Covid-19 guidelines.


Dock Lines (again)....and again...and again!! By Ron Leo

- TWO lines on each of your 4 corners. Several, especially on B dock, are lacking!
- TWO wraps on your pilings, then cleat off. The piling carries the load; the cleat will not!
- DON'T overlap your 2 lines on the pilings. It makes them difficult to adjust.
- SPRINGLINES fore & aft.
- DOCK POWER LINES secured and OUT of the water!
- CROSS YOUR LINES and tie off crossed.
 - **Example:** starboard bow lines, one to starboard cleat, one to port cleat, and vice versa. If a cleat pulls out, you will remain secure. The same applies to aft lines.
- RINGS: if you have them, one line on each ring. There are 4 rings on each tide-slide piling: 2 for you, 2 for your neighbor.
- WORN/ROTTED/FRAYED LINES: monitor/replace as needed.

Please review these reminders, take a close look at your lines, and adjust as necessary. Remember, we have a ROPE ROOM if you are in need of additional line!

Note: It is permitted to moor your boat bow or stern in!

In Non-Spin, Margaret Alexander won both races in her San Juan 21 Orion. She beat out Dave Whitney in Silent Pursuit. Third in both races by a total of 21 seconds was Connor McCue in his San Juan 23 from Hancock. Connor is a Marine and we welcome him to our various events.


upcoming Events

MAINE PASSAGE IN TANGO

(Four BSCers left June 16 for a two to three week cruise from Cutler, Maine to New Bern in Tango, a sailboat something longer than 30 feet and somewhat less than ship shape. This is Luigi's log of the first few days at sea as told to Dave Novak, Drew and Jennie Pledger and Roberta Lindau.)

Friday...flew to Bangor. Picked up by Freddie Marshall--a bit looped and expecting four men--who drove us and six duffle bags, two boxes, a guitar, three assorted carryons and a bundle of antennae and poles to Cutler, Maine where Tango awaited us. She was beautiful at a distance. Up close was a different story.

The running rigging would do a Sunfish proud. The anchor rope was sufficient to hold a SJ 21 in a 20 knot wind. The equipment aboard included the bottom of a bikini, very stiff, leaking cans of varnish, mildew four inches thick and lots of spare tennis shoes. A yachtsman's dream.

Patient throughout, Freddie appeared eager to return to the "lonely Budweiser" in his car so we bid him adieu and set about making our home seaworthy.

After provisioning and repairs, we dined aboard amidst tension, fog horns and strange slurping noises. The unspoken doubt lingered in our hearts through the night. Was Tango seaworthy? What were the funny noises in the engine? Why was there no oil pressure? Was 25 feet of 1/4" line enough? What were those blobs floating in the bilge?

Sunday--our day of departure--started out looking beautiful and shortly turned ghastly as we encountered a pounding sea, a head-on wind and a cold wetness that seeped into the bones. The crew soon learned that although a steel hull may be watertight, a wooden deckhouse is not, as scores of leaks appeared. The wheel collapsed, the oil pressure totally disappeared and our spirits were damp. We passed through the many islands of Penobscot Bay to anchor in Mackerel Cove at Swan Island. Hot toddies raised our spirits and warmed our bones.

Next morning after breakfast, assorted repairs, pumping the bilge and taping the entire deck house and adding three quarts of oil, we wended our way through Casco passage where we spotted our first seals. They were friendly and curious. New Harbor was our day's end destination. The seas were calm and the fog was thick. We began to love the Loran, inventing fond names for it and keeping a constant check on our course. We managed to dodge several islands at a minute's notice. The end of the day found us fogged out and floundering about outside of New Harbor. At last, ten feet off to port, there it was: the bouy marking the entrance to the harbor--good old #2.

The insanely cheering crew received cool stares from the inhabitants of New Harbor who were brought to their porches by the toot of our fog horn as we pulled up to a floating dock amidst a hundred lobster boats.

Arriving too late to be served a lobster in the restaurant, we settled for a drink and an exquisite Chinese dimmer. We all called our loved ones.

Morning found New Harbor still socked in as a multitude of unemployed, surly looking males strolled the dock mumbling about what a beautiful day yesterday was and allowing how today was a bit hagey.

We set out for Cape Porpoise. And then the rhymthic pounding of the engine changed. Drew investigated the sputtering Acadia for two hours as Jennie steered the becalmed ship while Dave and Roberta offered technical assistance. All to no avail. We called the Coast Guard in Portland and they performed a non-gracious rescue. After Dave convinced them we were not stealing the boat (who would want it?) we had dinner in an elegant tourist restaurant. Being somewhat inelegant ourselves, we returned to the ship and washed up. During our stay at the state dock, a procession of strange people trickled down to check us out and offer their own view of our situation. We welcomed some and feured others.

At the time of this writing, we asked the verdict on the engine. One lan offered is that we attempt to get Coast Guards to tow us down the coast. Luigi says there has to be a better way-we'll see.


