and the results will be presented at the General Meeting in November.



Arch Altman for Commodore:



My name is Arch Altman and I am currently serving as Commodore of the Club. I am running for a third term to provide continuity to the initiatives that have been pursued before and since my first election as Commodore.

The responsibilities of the Commodore are enumerated in the By-Laws, but also include maintaining the health and welfare of the Club and its members.

Over the past nearly two years, much has occurred to challenge us as a Club---namely, Covid and its effects. This has been dealt with periodic review of the Covid mitigation rules at the Club. In addition, the rebuild of the Docks, post-Florence has been completed.

The Club has acquired about a half acre of land outside the Gate, on higher ground, to accommodate the storage of dry storage boats during a flooding scenario. We are also imminently purchasing about

24 acres of a land adjacent to the Club as future investment and, more immediately, to possibly develop more revenue producing Dry Storage. The purchase price for this land is quite reasonable and will insure a future expansion site for a new Clubhouse, or whatever. This is much higher ground than our current 2.5 acres.

In addition, we continue to repair and upgrade certain parts of our facilities that need attention under the guidance and leadership of the Vice Commodore, Mark Hittner.



My husband, Mark Weinheimer, and I joined Blackbeard Sailing club in 2016 after participating in racing events there since the early 1990's. We are currently active in San Juan 21 fleet 8.

I was introduced to recreational sailing in my late teens in Door County, Wisconsin but didn't "embrace" the sport until I met Mark in 1973. Since then it's been pretty much "full immersion". In 1975 we bought a very tired 1937 classic Alden cutter and restored her, living aboard and cruising her a bit until 1980. We then built a fiberglass 33 footer from a bare hull, intending to cruise her in the Caribbean. We launched "Pelican" in 1984. (She was at BSC for a number of years with a subsequent owner.) While we lived aboard the Alden and built our 2nd cruising boat I began racing as crew on MORC boats in Tampa Bay. I also did a few offshore deliveries and enjoyed "blue water" sailing.

In 1985 we had the opportunity to work as the team sailmakers for Dennis Conner's "Sail America" campaign and helped bring the Cup to San Diego in the 1987 America's Cup challenge. This changed the trajectory of our lives. Somehow, the dream of long term cruising faded. We were recruited by Randy Smyth and headed to California in 1988 to run his sail loft, where I was production manager and purchaser. In 1990 we decided to come back to the East Coast and researched areas for waterfront property. We found Oriental, moved back aboard Pelican and bought land on shallow "Button Gut" off of Broad Creek. By the next season we were sailing in the local PHRF fleet, either on the Moore 24, "Nevermoore", or other local boats. Being light and agile, I was usually the "point". I have been racing, in either the PHRF fleet or "one design" on San Juan 21's, since then.



Tom Anderson for Director:

In the short term, our 2022 Board will face a post-COVID BSC that will renew the full social calendar, racing and cruising schedules, and other events. The 2022 Board must accomplish this with sensitivity to all members' needs, many whom are older, or have conditions that may continue to require some measures minimizing the spread of contagion. Other opportunities include the refit of B-Dock, following the successful upgrades to A and C docks. This will also require an assessment of the steel sea wall, which may require repairs and upgrades. The recent land purchase provides the 2022 Board with opportunities for long-term plans, space for additional dry slips, and expanded space for youth sailing programs. You may be aware of additional opportunities to improve club programs and infrastructure. Any BSC member with ideas is encouraged to contact the Board.

I offer management and organizational skills that I have acquired over a long career in private industry, managing global R&D programs for BASF and FMC Corps, and also my own company, Entoniche Consulting, LLC. I've organized international workshops, tours, and courses for the USDA Foreign Agricultural Service. So, we became the people that sold everything and homeschooled. We bought a 54 foot South African ketch that hadn't moved in years, turned green in the Portland rain and bought from a man I didn't know was dying and had missed his opportunity to cruise. We named her Tea Leaves....a gypsy had foretold our adventure in Boston five years before we ever thought of going. We refit her and in the process, I climbed a very steep learning curve.

In September of 2000, after a trip down the river, we cast off in Astoria, crossed the Columbia River Bar, the graveyard of the Pacific and turned left. Aboard was Darci, myself, four kids, two dogs and a cat.

We sailed down the Pacific coast, and spent years cruising in the Sea of Cortez and the Baja. We would begin and end in Guaymas, Sonora...hauling out in a shrimp yard in those days and drive back to Idaho for the summer. We learned to rehab houses....after you've worked on boats in exotic places long enough, remodeling houses is a piece of cake.

Every October, we'd journey back to Mexico. The kids grew up....went off to be captains and coasties and such...one even still lives on a boat... but importantly for this story....most ended up, at that time, on the east coast. We chased our kids.

In 2012, Darci and I left the northern Sea of Cortez and headed south...just us, one dog and two cats and headed for North Carolina via the Panama Canal. It was fantastic...all of it.

We took the Western Caribbean route once through the canal and came to Key West by Honduras and Isla Mujeres. I drew 8 feet in those days, so as you can imagine, I was aground often once I came back into the states. Eventually, I cried uncle and left Ft. Lauderdale for the gulfstream. We didn't come in again until the Cape Fear River.

There are twists and turns and stories galore to life, of course, but this story has to end for now. Suffice it to say that what does pertain is that somewhere along the way I became a 100 ton Master, and an ASA certified sailing instructor. I trained as a relief skipper on a tugboat, but mostly worked as a deck hand, and ran up and down the ICW and the Chesapeake for a bit.

We sold Tea Leaves in Wilmington and I said never again. But that didn't happen. There was another boat within a few months. And it continues even now. Next month, we are planning on bringing our new to us Fisher 37 down the Chesapeake to her new home.

During all of these adventures, we rehabbed houses. We own Carolina Fixers these days and buy sell and renovate single family homes. We live in Fairfield Harbour.

I believe the club offers an absolutely unique experience. It's everything a sailing club should be and frankly, I don't know enough yet to have all the answers. But I listen. After a year on the board I'm more convinced than ever that we have something to treasure and protect. The club turns 50 this year and I am hopeful that we can have more fun, more celebrations and competition and simply entertain and make more close friendships, than ever before.

If instead, we have a year where we must take care and be protective of each other...then sailing from our corner of the earth as a respite from the world might be, probably is, just as good.



New Covid Protocol for Blackbeard Facilities

I know that there are members who for one reason or other cannot, or will not, get the vaccine. I would ask that those folks respect the concerns of those who have, and wear a mask inside the Clubhouse and Bathhouse.


