Vice Commodore, and Rear Commodore,



Turkey Trot - 2022

The 2022 Blackbeard Sailing Club Turkey Trot is "in the books"! A big thank you to our dedicated Race Committee, and the photographers on the water.

The San Juan 21 fleet was somewhat diminished for various reasons, but five of the nine registered boats made it to the course. We had a great showing of Sunfish, with nine sailing out of ten registrants. The single registered Ensign didn't make it out. I won't repeat the results, which are posted elsewhere.

It was a beautiful day on the water, with bright sunshine and temperatures in the high 50s. Breeze conditions were very light and shifty, topping out at about 5 mph by mid-afternoon. In memory of Ken Gurganus, who ran this race for years, our PRO, Bill Jarvis, used the 4 course option sheet that Ken had always used, with the start/finish line set in the middle of the weather leg.

Our first race was a single W/L, with an upwind finish. It was a struggle to stay in the breeze, and there were lead changes as puffs and lulls favored one boat, then another. What breeze there was also shifted, so it was very important to watch the shroud tell-tails, and trim to any new tickle that lifted them. The entire San Juan class rounded the leeward mark in a 5 wide "pinwheel," which was tough for the outside boat!

Our second race was a straight triangle. The breeze direction steadied out a bit (or so we thought) but didn't get any stronger. After the Sunfish class started, and the San Juans were in sequence, we realized that a zephyr had temporarily filled in behind us, so some of us were able to start on port with the same heading we thought would be a starboard tack start. After a few minutes the breeze went back to a beat, but it was really keeping us on our toes. There was some passing lane action on the reaches which was fun! We hadn't sailed a triangular course in quite a while.

The third, and final race of the day had the best breeze, but it was still very soft and shifty. We had a modified "Gold Cup" course (triangle, W/L/W). We had to pay attention to the shifts and lulls, but it was the

most consistent breeze of the day. By the time we all finished there was no time for a 4th race.

There were numerous groundings as we avoided tacking until (past) the last second, and a few fouls,


but, all in all, it was a wonderful day!

Ensign Season Ends with a Blowout

With abbreviated race dates, and an abbreviated fleet, Ensign fleet 19 ended the 2022 year on November 10th, the eve of Tropical Storm *lan*. Of the fourteen scheduled race dates, five were canceled due to too much or too little wind. Of the six fleet members, three are on the hard due to medical or damage situations. Nonetheless, five competed in the Spring series, and four in the Fall.

The final race was in wind right on the edge of the max allowed winds rule (15 knots sus-

tained) with Long Shot, Mutiny and Blue Note on the line. The start was tight on a 15-second line and Mutiny led at the windward mark. She and Blue Note flew spinnakers, or rather the spinnakers flew them. Control was very difficult in the quartering chop. Blue Note led at the bottom and never gave up the lead. There were no chutes on the last run. Long Shot had only two crew, so they were slower, but safer under plain sail.

Blue Note (Mark and Mary Hittner, Jerry Rezab and I) repeated as season and annual winners, with awards by Fleet Captain Mark Hallquist. The dinner/social/awards were held at BSC, and were well attended by racers and race committee members. There were many of the latter, but Stephanie Davies organized committees and acted several times as PRO. Bill Jarvis was often PRO during both series, and Chris Davies took lots of pics from the mark boat. Many others pitched in, including at the socials.

On Saturday, November 20, four young ETYSA sailors woke up in their hotel rooms in New Orleans. Having sailors in two different fleets, sailing staggered racing, proved to be a bit tricky from a coaching standpoint, but, as always, Coach Glenn was up for the challenge! Parents eagerly watched from the warm, third floor of Southern Yacht Club as their 8th to 10th graders sailed through choppy waves to the starting line. At times, the waves were so high the boats were no longer visible; all you could see were the wool caps on the sailors' heads, and mainsails fully powered up.

Saturday racing was definitely thrilling! Our junior sailors learned firsthand the importance of proper foul weather gear. At times, it looked like the snow scene from Christmas Vacation, as parents and coaches helped our sailors put on layer after layer to keep in the warmth and keep out the cold. Despite the harsh conditions, each time Coach Glenn went down to the rotation docks, the junior sailors were all smiles. They were flying across Lake Pontchartrain, smashing through waves, staying upright, and finishing each and



every race. In the short time it took to switch boats, the kids fueled up with M&Ms, granola bites, and Pepsi. They had no down time, no subs, and they were loving every minute of it!

ETYSA at Great Oaks in New Orleans

After the first full day of racing (four hours in harsh conditions!), the New Bern Bears finished 9th in the Green Fleet, and Epiphany finished 13th in the Red Fleet. These finishes placed both teams in the Silver Fleet for Day 2 of racing.

Sunday morning brought even rougher conditions! Arriving at Southern Yacht Club early Sunday morning, our teams faced temperatures in the low 40s, winds of 18+ kts, and even BIGGER waves. The PRO decided these conditions were too intense for small dinghies and young sailors and postponed the race until 10:00 a.m. with a Harbor Start.

At 9:40 a.m., our teams started gearing up! They had learned a tremendous amount the day before and knew exactly what to wear to keep their hands, feet, core, and heads warm. They launched their 420s from the Southern Yacht Club docks promptly at 10:00, all smiles and enthusiastic anticipation for another exciting day of racing.

Conditions continued to improve as Day 2 of racing progressed. The sun started shining, temperatures warmed up into the upper 50s, winds settled into the 8-12 kts range, and the waves were a bit less angry. Our teams used all the skills they had gained during their high school season practices, regional regattas, and coach's debriefs to hold their own on the racecourse. Particularly impressive were New Bern's leeward mark roundings, and Epiphany's excellent starts, setting up right on the line nearly every race.

At the end of the day, New Bern finished in 7th place, and Epiphany finished in 13th. More important than where they ranked though, was the victorious display of grit, determination, and perseverance. These middle and high schoolers sailed in conditions they have never faced before. They were, in the words of Coach Glenn, "frogs in a blender." They had no subs, and all four of them sailed every single race. They never once complained, and never once even considered giving up. Their coaches and parents are incredibly proud of what these young sailors accomplished at the Great Oaks Invitational Regatta at Southern Yacht Club in New Orleans on November 20 and 21. And we can't wait to go back next year!

creates a love and appreciation of solitude and introspection, as well as coinciding opportunity for healthy rival friendships with folks that become family.




We have a new website with lots of new features, and some old links (like your favorite - Web Cams)!




Pirate Net Map...


