Steph: "Tell them, thank you very much for all the hard work they accomplished."



Edward Teach - ETYSA

Edward Teach Youth Sailing Association (ETYSA) is a program devoted to teaching youth to sail while cultivating a love of the sport. ETYSA was founded by members of BSC over 10 years ago. It continues to grow every season, in spite of setbacks by Florence and COVID.

This summer was one of the most successful yet! The summer camp ran for seven weeks with 140 total registrations. Approximately half of the kids in attendance were brand new campers, half were returning campers, and nearly 30 campers attended multiple weeks. The local community has truly embraced ETYSA, and it was exciting to see so many kids from New Bern and the surrounding areas



at camp this summer. Of course, it is always wonderful to welcome the grandchildren of BSC members and Fairfield Harbour residents.

BSC members contribute to the success of the program by volunteering their time during camp, and supporting events like the ETYSA Regatta and Silent Auction that was held in September. Your support has been greatly appreciated by all involved in ETYSA. During the regatta in September, some of the more advanced ETYSA youth enjoyed crewing on the bigger boats. Their assistance in crewing was greatly appreciated, and enjoyed by those of us who had them aboard. During the awards ceremony, ETYSA debuted the Ken Gurganus Memorial Award for the Outstanding Junior Instructor in Training (J.I.T.). The J.I.T. program has been instrumental in developing leadership skills among ETYSA's older youth, and establishing a rapport with younger campers, which leads to an overall feel of camaraderie and community during each camp week. Graham Foster was the first recipient of this annual award.

With the success of summer camp, ETYSA is beginning to produce intermediate and advanced sailors who are ready for the next step in their sailing journey, specifically high school sailing. This fall is the 2nd season ETYSA youth have competed in the Interscholastic Sailing Association (ISSA) high school sailing circuit. In addition, 12 youth attended regular practices and competed on two JV teams, representing Epiphany and New Bern. The high school racers attended two regattas, one at Lake Norman Yacht Club, and one at Crosswinds Boating Center at Jordan Lake. At both events, the race teams were very successful! At Lake Norman, the New Bern Bears placed 2nd in JV, and Epiphany placed 6th. At Lake Jordan, the two teams dominated, placing 2nd and 3rd in the JV division. These results are particularly impressive because they are sailing against larger, more experienced schools, with well-established teams of older high school students. Our young teams of 8th-10th graders, were often racing against teams of Juniors and Seniors, who were in their 3rd and 4th seasons of high school sailing. As a result of their impressive showing at these regattas, both teams have been accepted to compete at the Great Oaks Invitational Regatta at Southern Yacht Club in New Orleans, LA, in November. Great Oaks is a national-level

developmental regatta geared towards new teams, offering them the opportunity to compete against their peers across the country. The Epiphany team went last year and had an amazing experience. The youth sailors and their coaches are looking forward to this incredible opportunity again this November. Plans are already in the works to continue to grow the high school sailing program next year.

ETYSA is not only focused on producing high-level racers. Head instructor Coach Glenn's first and true love is the beginner sailor. The summer camp certainly focuses on this demographic. However, there are quite a few youth within the community who were unable to attend camp, were unsure of committing to an entire week, or who wanted to continue their sailing education beyond the summer. To meet the demands of this group, and to continue to grow the beginner program, ETYSA introduced a new program: Fall Learn to Sail. This program met after school, one day a week for three weeks. In these shorter sessions, beginning sailors learned all the skills taught during the first three days of camp. They were on the water from the very first lesson, and by the third lesson were sailing independently in the creek. We encourage kids who participated in Fall Learn to Sail to sign up for camp this summer to continue developing their skills, solidifying their confidence, and growing their love of sailing. The goal is also to offer a Spring Learn to Sail, leading up to the 2023 summer camp season.

ETYSA is experiencing tremendous success growing the youth sailing program in the New Bern area. The members, families, coaches, staff, and Board are greatly appreciative of the continued support of BSC members. Your enthusiasm, contributions, and support do not go unnoticed.






